'Dumbphones' – handsets that just make calls and send texts – remain useful as they are relatively inexpensive, said a telecoms expert.

"It makes sense especially in countries where the network service is not great," he explained.

Sarah was just 13 when she rode her first wave and 1 it was love at first ride. She was probably among the first teenagers to surf along the east coast of Malaysia.

2 Sarah had an early introduction to surfing. She grew up watching her father, a pioneer of the Malaysian surf scene some 15 years ago, surfing with his peers. It was not long before she had a go at surfing herself. A great



advocate for the sport he loved, Sarah's father was proud to see that she progressed quickly through all the learning stages.

Sarah shares her father's passion for the sport. "I really enjoy squash and 10 swimming but, for me, there's nothing in the world like surfing," she says. Surfing has always been a key aspect of Sarah's life. When her father realised she had an inherent talent, she began accompanying him regularly on his surf trips. "So, surfing was never anything unusual to me," she says, now an undergraduate at 15 Universiti Malaya. "For a few years, I even had intensive coaching from my dad."

Sarah belongs to a growing circle of female surfers who are fearless. They are not intimidated by the waves that sometimes tower over them. In fact, the more towering the waves, the better. It is the intense feeling they give that the surfers seek. Surfing is not the easiest of sports, of course. The waves pounding 20 against you can be painful. And that is by no means the end of it. The blazing sun can also burn your skin.

"One day, I came back from the beach bright red because I'd forgotten to use my sunblock," says Sarah with a laugh. "My mum was horrified and wanted me to stop surfing. There was no way I was going to agree to that. I tried to 25 convince her how much I loved surfing, but it didn't make any difference. It was only after I won a couple of competitions that she gave in."

- One issue faced by surfing enthusiasts is the lack of public awareness 6 about the sport, which is why it has not really become popular in Malaysia. Besides, they also have to handle the general perception that surfing is dangerous 30 as it is an extreme sport.
